As economic activity in the province grew, the SBP recognized the need for expansion and moved to a **new**, **purpose-built office on 17th November**, **1984**. The original building was preserved and repurposed as the **SBP Library**, maintaining its historical importance.

Today, the SBP Quetta office plays a pivotal role in:

- Regulating and monitoring banking operations across Baluchistan.
- Providing currency distribution and cash management services.
- Supporting financial literacy and inclusion programs in remote regions.
- Facilitating economic research and development tailored to the region's needs.

## **Notable Landmarks & Educational Influence**

Apart from being an economic hub, Quetta also boasts several historic and natural attractions:

- Quaid-e-Azam Residency in Ziarat where the founder of Pakistan spent his last days.
- Hanna Lake a picturesque water body and popular tourist spot.
- Hazargangi Chiltan National Park home to the endangered Chiltan ibex.

The city also has a significant number of **educational institutions**, nurturing future professionals in banking, economics, and governance.




